Part 1 – Getting across the plains

We left Monday for another travel adventure with Lynne, Ruby, Dazzle and myself. This time we are headed out West, Northwest to be more exact. The first few days are mostly to get some distance between us and home, so being Friday night, we must be in Havre, Montana.

We spent our first night just outside of Alexandria, MN, the next night outside of Mandan (Bismarck) ND, at the Fort Abe Lincoln State Park. It is a very cool state park, old military barracks, right on the Missouri river, and it has a number of reconstructed Mandan Native American houses. We would go there again, so if you are on your way thru, it is worth a stop.

The next two nights were spent in the badlands, the north unit of the Teddy Roosevelt National Park. It is the smaller of the two parts of the park, but much less used. We saw lots of Bison, a golden eagle, and hiked around a bit. The cats were very nervous there, we think it was because the grasshoppers were so loud, but we are not really sure why. They were very calm at Abe Lincoln, and are very calm tonight, but were very nervous there.

We saw a huge eight point mule deer, and other wildlife and birds, one snake, and just a lot of beautiful, if harsh, country. Today we did a long driving day, almost 350 miles, and are staying in a

little private park. The next five days are glacier national park, and then into Canada for a visit to our neighbors to the north. The travel, while enjoyable, has been mostly centered on getting out this far. Most of the rest of our time keeps our travel days well below two hundred miles, so we should get a chance to see a lot more along the way.

The weather has been beautiful, 80's during the day, 60's or so at night. The mountains promise a drop in both ends of those temps, but lots more spectacular scenery. The local radio station was rather funny yesterday morning, the highs in their listening area (from western Montana and Wyoming, to middle parts of the Dakotas, was 95 degrees, the low, in Yellowstone, was 31 degrees. Pretty drastic, it would seem. Stay tuned for an update when we get out of glacier park.


